THE LIE MAKER By Linwood Barclay Fiction (2023) Available in Large Print

Jack is a writer whose previous two books marketed in the "so-so" category. His recent offering failed to reach a publisher. So, frustrated and running low in the money department, he accepts an offer from the government to write background life stories for individuals entering the Witness Protection Services. Jack also sees this as an opportunity to gain information about his father who entered the program when he was a child. All this must be done with the utmost secrecy. Lana, Jack's girlfriend, is a prominent reporter for a Boston newspaper, and she has an inquisitive mind, and investigative nature. Of course, she decides to snoop and discover what Jack's job is all about. And so, the web spinning begins, with each chapter adding a strong thread, attaching itself to one already spun. Though a complex plot, it is easy to follow. It seems as if Jack is telling you the story personally, maybe over dinner or cool drinks on the porch. You can stop him anytime—"Hey, Let's take a break for a piece of pie. We'll continue in a few minutes." But you won't want to delay too long.

PRESIDENT GARFIELD from Radical to Unifier

Celebrate this month of Presidential honoring by reading a new informative account of one of our lesser-known presidents. Give yourself the month to accomplish this feat as the tome is heavy on wordage as well as on holding. History classes lumped Pres. Garfield's term into a short sentence—he was from Ohio, and he was assassinated. It seemed we learned more about the western expansion and industrialization of the country than we did about the aftermath of the Civil War. This book reads well on its own, but it would be helpful to read the current biography of Grant first, as so many facets of Garfield's political rise were connected to Grant's leadership. Garfield was also a noted general for the North during the war and was led into the political arena immediately following its conclusion. He was a person everyone liked—he always found something good about everyone even when disagreeing over policies. His selection as a presidential candidate was to appease a fractured party. The text of his early years in the northeastern woods of Ohio is short but fascinating. He didn't want to farm and left home to be a towpath driver on the Erie Canal. His physical appearance is frequently mentioned. He was a large man, with an extremely huge head! He was genuine, humane, and intelligent. He was also killed soon into his presidency.

One of the most interesting impacts of this part of history is that it is so much like now. The Democrats were floundering with ideas, and suitable candidates. The Republican party was fractured, with a wide chasm. There was voter fraud. Political payoffs, too many aged "cronies", and scandals plagued both parties. No one wanted to deal with the conditions affecting general livelihood. Is this really the 1870s? Or is it the 2020s? Give this book a try. Also, the Garfield home in Mentor, Ohio makes a wonderful stop if you are prowling the NE shores of Lake Erie.
