Clerk's Corner: May Session Meeting

Meetings of the Congregation - Discernment

When a Presbyterian church needs a new pastor, the first step the Presbytery requires is not to hire a pastor, but discernment. This means figuring out who we are and what we are wanting from a pastor, because if we don't know who we are as a congregation, how can we choose a pastor who will meet our needs? Your Session had no idea how to define who we to the Presbytery. This is how we came to hire Holy Cow! They said they could help us do that. It is also why the survey results seem so strange: there aren't many surprises (we already knew at some level who we are), but Holy Cow used terms we were unfamiliar with to describe Westminster, thereby helping us learn a new way of thinking about things, which is what discernment is about.

Next Steps:

- There will be a Meeting of the Congregation after worship on Sunday, June 30th. Food will be provided. Please plan to attend. We can't say who we are as a group without all of us there.
- As of this newsletter publication, we do not have a set agenda for the meeting. All will be planned out prior to the meeting.
- We will have more time for discussion, since most of the presentation has been communicated.
- We need to make sure everyone feels heard without it becoming a gripe session: hear it, acknowledge it and move on.
- The feelings and thoughts of the congregation need to be incorporated into whatever we are doing.

We are inviting each other to our church and social activities. We will meet with Rev. Corzine again after July.

NO BETTER TIME By Sheila Williams Fiction (New)

Are you ready for another story related to WWII? It seems this era has produced numerous writings of fact and fiction the past few years. So, when I read the promo for this new book I produced a groan---"Another one ???" And yet, it seemed to be different. And that is the best way to explain it--different!!!

The story begins with the calling of military service to women—particularly, black women. The Women's Army Corp was just being formed, and with most ventures of this magnitude, adequate provisions were not in place. In fact, military big-wigs did not know what to do with this new situation. But recruiting began and women answered the call. This story centers around two women, their friendship and work with the 6888th Central Postal Directory—a multiethnic battalion. Details of army base life at this time are interesting, and the problems of prejudice (sexual and racial) well described. This unit served overseas and their dedication to getting mail to soldiers never faltered. Descriptions of buildings filled with undelivered packages and letters give us a picture of situations unknown to most, and formed the motto "No mail, low morale." This is a small book—a quick read, which will be a memorable one. It is upbeat and delightful. It does seem to have more appeal to the feminine gender though.

Book reviews for our newsletter began during the COVID shutdown, and thanks to your encouragement and comments, they have continued longer than expected. It seems now is the time, to bring them to a close—at least on a regular basis. The footstool still holds books, and I enjoy reading and writing.
